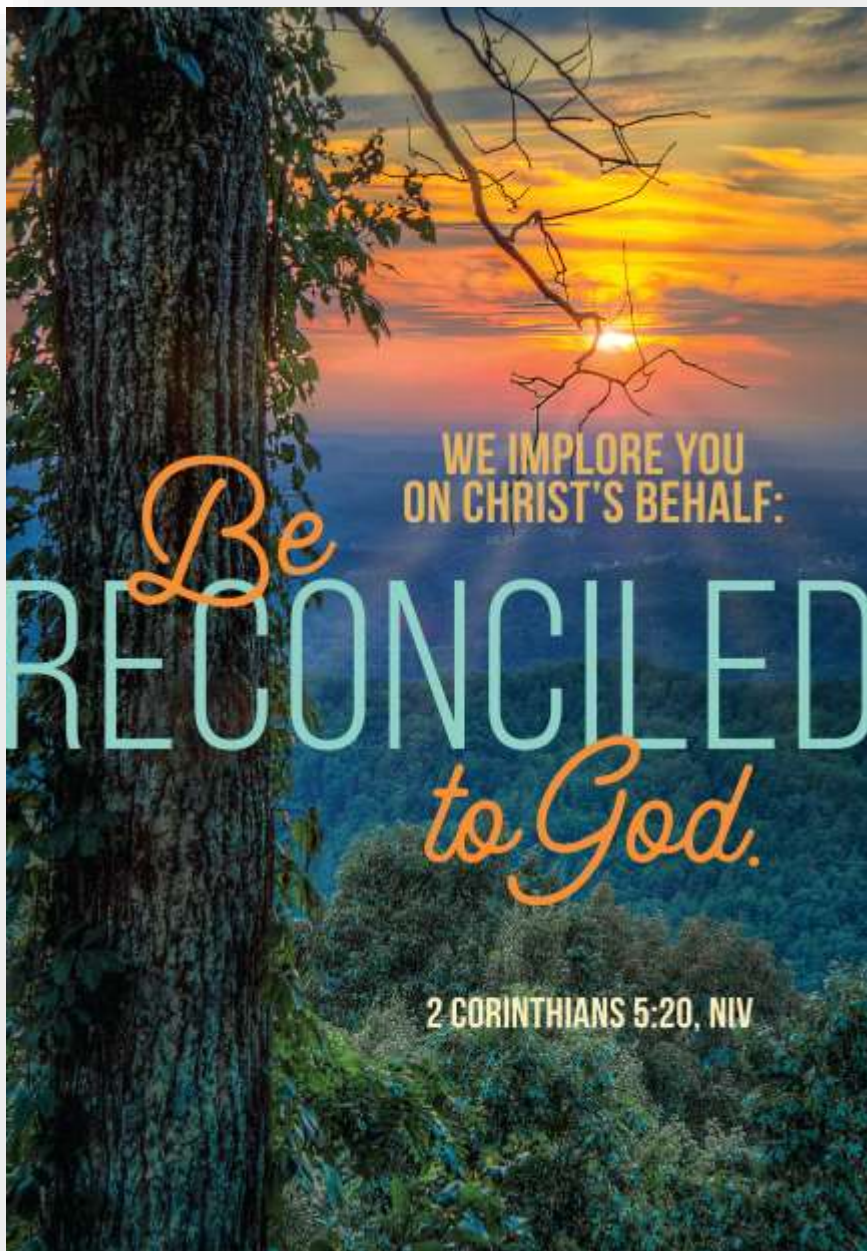

March 25 *Lavender House in Meuse* Gail Noble-Sanderson Leader TBA
and/or it's sequel *Passage Home to Meuse*
At the close of WWI, French Red Cross volunteer nurse helps others heal as she works toward her own recovery from what we would now term PTSD. A first in historical fiction from this Washington State author.

April 22 *A Gentleman in Moscow* Amor Towles Leader: Dottie Hawkins
“*A Gentleman in Moscow* is the utterly entertaining second novel from the author of *Rules of Civility*. Amor Towles skillfully transports us to The Metropol, the famed Moscow hotel where movie stars and Russian royalty hobnob, where Bolsheviks plot revolutions and intellectuals discuss the merits of contemporary Russian writers, where spies spy, thieves thieve and the danger of twentieth century Russia lurks outside its marbled walls....”

June 24 *Killers of the Flower Moon* David Grann Leader TBA

After oil was discovered beneath their land, the Osage rode in chauffeured automobiles, built mansions, and sent their children to study in Europe. Then, one by one, the Osage began to be killed off.... As the death toll rose, the newly created FBI took up the case, and the young director, J. Edgar Hoover, turned to a former Texas Ranger named Tom White to try to unravel the mystery...”

Library Update - Library Treasures Old and New



We continue to round up and add titles to support exciting new developments here at First Presbyterian. Last month we spotlighted a few selections that offer new perspectives on individual and communal life. Here are some additions:

In *Said I Wasn't Gonna Tell Nobody: the Making of a Black Theologian* (230.092 Con), James S. Cone, late Union Seminary systematic theology professor, writes movingly of his struggle to be true to his own experience and to the reality of the beloved community. This 2018 book, his last, is part memoir, part history, part insight into black power and theology. He pulls in themes of music, especially the spirituals and the blues, focusing on their significance to black survival in the slavery era.

Ecowomanism (Melanie Harris, 202.082 Har) draws a parallel between treatment of the earth and treatment of black women. *Just Mercy: a Story of Justice and Redemption* (Bryan Stevenson, 353.4 Ste) emphasizes inequity in incarceration rates and calls for justice, drawing on Stevenson's experience as a black attorney.

Estuary Angels are working with new Director of Children's Ministry, Erin Lorio, to encourage youth participation in creation care. We have assembled and listed some of our holdings in this significant genre. Some of these materials will be on display in the children's library as we approach our annual April Earth Week emphasis. They will replace the February display of Black History Month selections for our younger readers.

For personal perspectives from survivors of childhood abuse, see *Educated: a Memoir* (Tara Westover, 270.092 Wes) and *The Hope Factor: Discovering the Light through Your Pain* (local author Sue Mocker, 262.2 Moc).

To lead into Lent, which begins March 6, we will be adding some titles devoted to the Seven Last Words of Jesus Christ. They will supplement existing works on the passion narratives in the four Gospels.

Watch the display areas of the main library and the children's library to view - or check out - some of our treasures old and new.

Every Wednesday evening FPCE sponsor's "Dinner at the Bell" and outside in the alley are two trucks/trailers; one is Frank Fargo's "Showers to the People" and the other one is a truck converted to do laundry. Here, is the story of "Showers to the People".

SHOWERS TO THE PEOPLE

WHAT IS IT? "Showers to the People" is a Christian shower ministry started in June 2008. My wife Louise Fargo and I created "Showers to the People" because we saw a need in the community. The ministry gives showers to homeless and under resourced individuals. In the last 10½ years we have given 17,500 showers. A Ford F250 hauls a 26' modified 5th wheel trailer which has 2 showers that have endless hot water.

WHY DID WE START THIS? I came up with the shower idea, after reading *Under the Overpass* by Mike Yankoski, a college kid who went homeless for 5 months. During one period he didn't take a shower for 6 weeks. That is when I saw a need. Louise came up with the idea of supplying clean clothes after the showers. She also purchases supplies and stocks the trailer. Inside the trailer there are shelves filled with supplies.

WHAT SUPPLIES DO WE STOCK? We supply tee shirts size small to 4X; men's boxers, boxer briefs and regular briefs; women's underwear sizes 5 – 12.; men and women's socks short and tall.; we also supply toiletries which include soap, shampoo, conditioner, tooth brushes, tooth paste and deodorant. We have 3 sets of towels that are given to the customers; big one to dry with, dish towel to put on the floor so they don't slip and fall and a wash cloth. Inside the stalls are a dispenser with soap, shampoo and conditioner.

We also supply, when available, sleeping bags and blankets. We get these items from Helping Hands. They also supply tee shirts. In the back of my truck are clothes for the clients. We put them out for people to browse thru.

WHERE AND WHEN DO WE OFFER SHOWERS TO THE PEOPLE: Every Wednesday night the shower trailer arrives with Frank the shower guy pulling into Everett First Presbyterian church's back alley with 15 to 20 people waiting for him to arrive and ready to sign up for a shower. This is to serve the guests that participate in the Dinner at the Bell which is offered by Everett First Presbyterian every Wednesday evening.

Every week Joan Lyderson a member of FPCE picks up about 6 big bags of clothes from the Everett Assistance League which we put out for our guests.

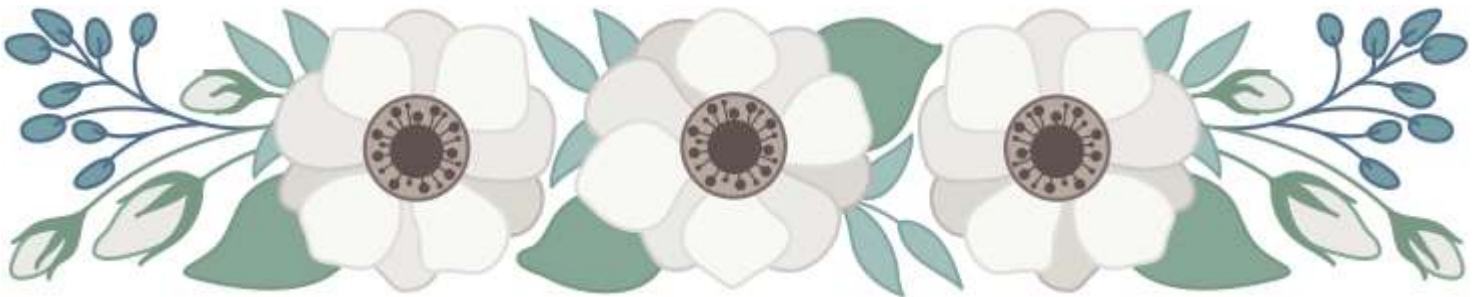
On Saturday morning the trailer arrives at 8 a.m. to do more showers at Trinity Lutheran church in Lynnwood. The trailer stays for 8 hours +- and does 30 to 45 showers depending on the weather or time of the month.

At 11 a.m. every week on Saturday, our group has volunteer's that come to serve lunch.

Donate These Items for a Second Use

The Imagine Children's Museum appreciates items for children's craft projects: tin cans – soup cans; 1/2-gallon paper milk cartons – rinsed out, please; ribbon – for wrapping presents; wire – any kind for use on Recycle Day; pine cones; yarns; shoe boxes and tissue boxes; fake flowers, leaves, and vines; stickers; buttons; keys. It's easy to drop things off at the museum, Hoyt and Wall. Inside the main entrance, turn left, and in the coat room is a big container. You can drop and go.

Simple Things You Can Do to Help Protect the Earth

Put on a sweater. When you turn up the heat in winter, your furnace may be burning fossil fuel. Your sweater or warm robe will keep you warmer and will help conserve resources and reduce climate change.

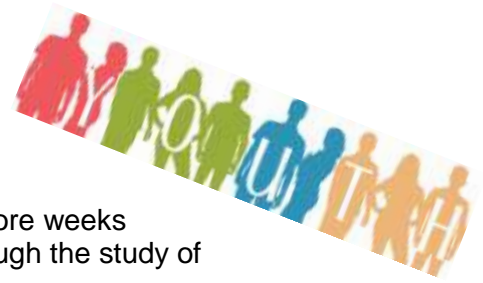
